



The 2016/2017 year was a productive year for us at Paws for Hope Animal Foundation. In addition to continuing to provide assistance to animal groups and directly helping animals and their guardians here in British Columbia, we embarked on two in-depth strategic planning and team building workshops. Paws for Hope was also recognized by a national award.

It has truly been an honour to continue to lead the Board of Directors and to work closely with Paws for Hope's Executive Director on many initiatives over this past year. We worked to develop a unified plan that will see us grow and expand our current services, along with formalizing the Animal Welfare Advisory Network of BC, a collaborative effort for the advancement of animal issues led by Paws for Hope through the work of our Executive Director, Kathy Powelson.

One of the biggest highlights for me has been working to strengthen our partnerships in the veterinary community and solidifying the support of the College of Veterinarians of BC for our animal health clinics. With this committed support and sponsorship we are now working to expand our direct veterinary outreach into communities outside of Vancouver. Look for us to announce clinics in New Westminster and Surrey later this autumn.

Paws for Hope was recognized last year by the Canadian Veterinary Medical Association who awarded me with the annual CVMA Humane Award. It was an honour to have been chosen in recognition of the work establishing our veterinary outreach clinics and because of the goals and ambitions of our Roxy's Relief Program. This program has continued to develop its reach over the years, but its main focus has always been to recognize the positive impact pets have on vulnerable populations, including those that are homeless.

A special thank you to our members and donors—without your belief in the work we do we would not be where we are today. Thank you to our Executive Director for her tireless efforts on behalf of companion animals and for those who need a voice, and thank you to all of our volunteers and directors who devote many hours of their time to advance the work of Paws for Hope.

One of the greatest experiences in the work I do with Paws for Hope Animal Foundation is the opportunity to connect, work with and support an army of like-minded, caring individuals. Through our community partners, I witness the commitment to support and advocate for the most vulnerable people in our community. Our veterinary partners show such dedication to ensuring vulnerable pets receive the veterinary care they need. Our rescue partners and volunteers sacrifice so much of their time and resources to save the lives of animals. And our donors, who believe in the work we are doing, trust us to use their contributions in a way that will be most meaningful to animals. It is from these people that I draw inspiration and strength.

When I turn the news on at night and it feels that there is little hope, I remind myself of this compassionate army and how hard they work every day to make our world a better place—and I am profoundly grateful.
