Keeping pets and their people together—even through a global pandemic

At the time of writing, the COVID-19 pandemic has been a part of our lives for 16 months. And while we still have a long road ahead of us, there is both cause for optimism and reason to look back at some of the amazing things we have accomplished together despite what the past year and a half has thrown at us.

Like so many social services, animal welfare and rescue organizations were instantly impacted by the pandemic. Our sector very quickly began to see a significant increase in all manner of requests for support. Veterinary services were reduced and our shelter colleagues cleared out their kennels and closed their doors to the public.

Fortunately for us, because Paws for Hope was already a virtual and remotework organization, we were able to respond incredibly quickly to the needs of communities across the province and fill in some of those emerging gaps.



As a result of funding opportunities that were made available specifically to address the impact of the pandemic, we were also able to step up in a major way to help families, animals, and organizations in need. Through our veterinary funding and foster care program, we were able to help almost 900 animals and their loving families over the past year.

We are in unprecedented times of chaos and confusion and social upheaval, but keeping pets and people together remains more important than ever and our number one priority. And without a doubt, this past year has reinforced the significance that pets have in our lives and the importance of the work that we are doing.

For that reason, we are so very grateful to our volunteers, foster caregivers, board members, staff, and supporters who helped us rise to the challenges of the past year and enabled us to reach out and support more animals and their families than ever before. Thank you so very much.

Responding with care

The significant role pets play in our mental, physical, and social health became very pronounced in 2020. We saw first-hand how much joy and support and comfort our furry family members brought to us during the challenging weeks of stay-at-home orders that quickly turned into months.

At the same time, thousands of people across the province found themselves unemployed and struggling to cover the bare necessities—reinforcing the urgent need to expand our social safety net to include pets.

Paws for Hope and BC's entire animal welfare sector saw a significant increase in requests for support due to the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. However, public health orders also had a direct impact on our ability to deliver services, resulting in the cancellation of all of Paws for Hope's in-person animal health clinics. Spay and neuter services were put on hold for months.

Despite these challenges, we were able to pivot and quickly adjust and enhance our programs to ensure we could respond in appropriate and meaningful ways.

In addition to increasing our veterinary funding budget, we expanded our crisis foster care program to include anyone experiencing crisis and needing a temporary place for their pet(s). We enhanced and relaunched our veterinary care support program under a 'one welfare' approach to better align the resources of social service agencies, veterinary service providers, and community funding.

- We helped **405** pets access emergency veterinary care
- We provided \$177,182 in veterinary funding support
- We provided \$63,482 worth of veterinary care to foster animals in our No Pet Left Behind program
- We spayed/neutered **300** pets

We believe that in order to create meaningful and lasting change for pets, we must also recognize the needs of their people and you will see that belief in our approach to all of the work we do.





Pets, people are Better Together

This year, we enhanced and re-launched our **BETTER TOGETHER** program. We hired a dedicated Human Support Coordinator to help improve access to veterinary care for under-served families and connect them with both social service and animal care professionals. **OVER 110 FAMILIES** have already enrolled in the new program since January 2021.

Our **NO PET LEFT BEHIND** program fostered **64 PETS** (dogs, cats, guinea pigs, and more) for people who were experiencing a crisis and needed a safe place for their animals to stay. From a few weeks to as long as 8 months, our volunteer foster homes ensured there was a safe place for their pets to go while individuals receive the help they need.

We also expanded our reach to support community cats. We worked with Dawson Creek/Fort St. John and Port McNeill/Sointula to take in and find new homes for 52 cats and kittens. We also funded the spay and neutering of 54 community cats in both locations.



The animal welfare sector in BC continues to play a vital role in the care and protection of animals across the province and internationally. With the diverse issues our communities experience, our sector must be able to respond to these diverse needs.

We support the professionalization of the sector and its important, lifesaving work through our Animal Welfare Advisory Network of BC and our Guardian Angel Grants, creating a more robust and sustainable animal welfare system.
